
Last, but not least, I have to give a big thanks once again to Sean Gautreaux for creating another incredible piece of art.








































History of the Mardi Gras Bead Dog®

Up until the 1960's, New Orleans Mardi Gras krewes threw glass beads. In the mid 1960's, plastic beads replaced glass beads as the throw of choice.

Often when beads were thrown from floats, they became tangled and broken. Children enjoyed sorting through the tangled beads. Soon they discovered when the beads were twisted in various directions they could create different animals.

The most popular and easiest to make was the bead dog. Cub Scout and Brownie Troops, school clubs and various groups of children made the little Bead Dogs and sold them for fundraising activities. Haydel's Bakery decided that this historical little dog would be a wonderful way to give back to the community by raising funds for local charities. Coinciding with Haydel's 50th Anniversary, the Haydel's Mardi Gras Bead Dog® was born. In 2008, local New Orleans artist, Philip Weddle, was commissioned to create his rendering of the old time Mardi Gras Bead Dog®

Each year Haydel's raffles off a one-of-a-kind bead dog painted by a New Orleans area artist with the proceeds benefitting a local charity. The Mardi Gras Bead Dog® is a featured part of the way Haydel's Bakery gives back to the community. We hope you enjoy this revived piece of New Orleans tradition.
